Zebras

Zebras are single-hoofed and are related to horses and donkeys. They can be found in the grasslands, woodlands, deserts, and mountains of Africa. Zebras are social animals and live in groups called herds. When they migrate to find new grass to eat or water to drink, they move in "super herds" with thousands of other zebras. Sometimes other grazing animals, like antelope and wildebeest, also travel with the large group.

Zebras are easy to identify due to their bold stripes. Each of the three species of zebra have stripes that are different. Regardless of the pattern, the zebra stripes work as camouflage. Zebras in a group make it more difficult for a predator to zero-in on a single zebra prey. Zebra predators include lions, hyenas, cheetahs, and leopards. Although zebras look peaceful, they can be very aggressive when needed. Individual zebras can kick or bite. Groups of zebras also block predator attacks by working together to make a semi-circle.
